Niagara Health is pleased to provide you with general information about your upcoming procedure.

WHAT IS INTERVENTIONAL RADIOLOGY?

Interventional radiology treats a wide range of conditions by performing a non-invasive procedure through a small incision. Various imaging methods like x-ray, cat can or ultrasound can help guide the radiologist during the procedure.

WHAT INFORMATION SHOULD I PROVIDE BEFORE MY PROCEDURE?

A registered nurse from Interventional Radiology will call you before your appointment to discuss preparation for your procedure (ie: medications etc.).

WHAT SHOULD I WEAR?

You should wear comfortable clothing.

WHAT IF I COULD BE PREGNANT OR BREASTFEEDING?

A radiologist will have a conversation with you before your procedure to answer any questions.

WHAT SHOULD I BRING THE DAY OF THE PROCEDURE?

On the day of your procedure, you should bring:

- Your health card
- An updated list of medications you take

WHAT SHOULD I EXPECT DURING MY PROCEDURE?

Every procedure is slightly different. The registered nurse will give you a brief description of what to expect during your procedure when they call.

IS MY PROCEDURE PAINFUL?

Procedures can be uncomfortable but pain will be managed by local anesthetic as needed. Some procedures provide conscious sedation.

INTERVENTIONAL RADIOLOGY

HOW LONG WILL THE PROCEDURE TAKE?

Different procedures take a different amount of time. A procedure can range from 20 minutes to a couple hours. The registered nurse will ensure to inform you if you need to arrange for a ride home.

WHERE WILL MY RESULTS BE SENT?

Results from your procedure will be sent to your ordering physician. For biopsy results, it will take about 7-10 business days.

WHAT SHOULD I EXPECT AFTER MY PROCEDURE?

A post procedure information package will be sent home with you to review. Any follow up questions and check-ins will be done with your ordering physician.
